# Multi-Year Accessibility Plan

## for the Period December 2012 to December 2017

### 1.0 Purpose

This multi-year Accessibility Plan is developed in accordance with the Integration Accessibility Standards Regulation under the *Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005* (AODA). It outlines the intentions of the Board to meet its obligations under the *Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2001* (ODA). The Plan describes the measures that the Board will take over the five year period from 2013-2017 to identify, remove and prevent barriers to people with disabilities who work, learn and participate in the school board community and environment, including students, staff, parents and guardians, volunteers and visitors to the Board and its schools. The plan will be guided by the Board's Accessibility Standards-Policy Statement.

### 2.0 Objectives

This Plan:

- 2.1 Describes the process by which the Thunder Bay Catholic District School Board will identify, remove and prevent barriers;
- 2.2 Reviews recent efforts of the Thunder Bay Catholic District School Board to remove and prevent barriers;
- 2.3 Describes the measures the Thunder Bay Catholic District School Board will take in the period 2012-2017 to identify, remove and prevent barriers;
- 2.4 Makes a commitment to provide an annual status report on the Board's implementation of the Multi-Year Accessibility Plan;
- 2.5 Makes a commitment to review and update the Multi-Year Accessibility Plan at least once every 5 years;
- 2.6 Describes how the Thunder Bay Catholic School Board will make this accessibility plan available to the public.

### 3.0 Commitment to Accessibility Planning

This plan will be established, reviewed and updated in consultation with persons with disabilities, with the Board's Special Education Advisory Committee, and Accessibility Working Group. It will be presented to the Board for approval. The Thunder Bay Catholic District School Board is committed to:

- 3.1 Maintaining an Accessibility Working Group;

- 3.2** Continuing the process of consulting with persons with disabilities in the development and review of the multi-year plan;
- 3.3** Ensuring, wherever practicable, that Board policies, procedures and practices are consistent with the principles of accessibility and universal design. Where appropriate, the Accessibility Working Group will provide input with regard to new policies and procedures and to those under review;
- 3.4** Improving access to facilities, policies, programs, practices and services for students, staff, parents and guardians, volunteers and members of the community. Ongoing identification of barriers will be the responsibility of the Accessibility Working Group and will, wherever practicable, be incorporated in the multi-year plan.

The Director of Education has authorized the Accessibility Working Group to review and update the Multi-Year Accessibility Plan which will enable the Board to meet its commitments.

#### **4.0 Description of the Thunder Bay Catholic District School Board**

The Thunder Bay Catholic District School Board can trace its roots as far back as the mid 1800's, when Jesuit Missionaries established schools at the Fort William Mission. Schooling was continued by the Sisters of the Order of the Daughters of Mary, who arrived in 1870. The Sisters of St. Joseph arrived at Prince Arthur's Landing in 1881 and immediately began teaching in the new Catholic school, which was opened in 1880 in the St. Andrew's Church Sacristy.

In 1885, the Order of Daughters of Mary was recalled to their order in France, and the Sisters of St. Joseph assumed the responsibility for both the school and the orphanage.

Soon, a number of Catholic school boards were created. The Port Arthur Roman Catholic School Board was established on January 2, 1885. The Fort William Roman Catholic School Board was formed on April 10, 1901, and the Roman Catholic Separate School Board No. 6 McIntyre was established on January 1, 1957. The Combined Roman Catholic Separate School Board of Neebing, Paiponge and McIntyre was formed on January 15, 1967.

On January 1, 1969, the four school Boards were amalgamated in accordance with the Government of Ontario's plan to reduce the number of school Boards in the province. The newly amalgamated Board became known as the Lakehead District Roman Catholic Separate School Board.

As a consequence Bill 104 - Fewer School Boards Act, 1997, the Lakehead District Roman Catholic Separate School Board was designated by Ontario regulation in May 1997 as District School Board #34A. The regulation governing the establishment and areas of jurisdiction of District School Boards was further amended and the Board received notification from the Education Improvement Commission that its name had been approved. Effective January 1, 1998 the Board officially became known as the Thunder Bay Catholic District School Board.

The Thunder Bay Catholic District School Board employs approximately 1,416 employees and serves 8,400 students through two secondary, three senior elementary and fifteen elementary schools. The Board offers a complete French Immersion program at two of its schools. Physically, our schools are primarily conventional school structures, typically constructed with brick and metal cladding, and they vary in age from the late 1920's to as recent as 1999. Most of the buildings have been renovated and occasionally required the addition of portables to support the student population.

During the past year, the Board has entered into a long term accommodation planning process. There have been significant renovations and additions at a number of schools. Each project has been considered in light of our objectives under the AODA.

The Board's vision is "**Educating for Christian Values and Academic Excellence**". The philosophy of the Thunder Bay Catholic School Board is best described by its Mission Statement:

### Mission Statement

*The Thunder Bay Catholic District School Board is committed to providing quality education which combines academic excellence with a concern for the spiritual, moral, social, emotional, cultural and physical growth of the student.*

*This education is provided in a Christ-centered environment where Catholic faith and life are integrated into the total curriculum and school day. Through the ministry of teaching, the Board fulfills its mandate from parents, from the Ministry of Education, and from the Church.*

New school construction has adhered to the current Building Code and includes level access to schools, automatic door openers, elevators/lifts in schools of more than one floor, accessible washrooms.

## 9.0 Barriers to be Addressed Under the Multi-Year Accessibility Plan

The Integrated Accessibility Standards Regulation 191/11 filed in June, 2011 pursuant to the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005 identified specific requirements to achieve accessibility in the areas of:

- Information and Communications
- Employment
- Transportation

These requirements build on the Accessibility Standards for Customer Service which came into force in 2007.

Thunder Bay Catholic District School Board intends, through this Multi-year Accessibility Plan for the period 2012-2017, to take action to address barriers to accessibility related to the Standards areas of current Regulations. This is in addition to ongoing work of the Board regarding the identification and removal of barriers in the Board's physical environment.

**10.0 Review and Monitoring Process**

The Accessibility Working Group meets twice during the school year to review progress and evaluate the effectiveness of barrier-removal and prevention strategies and to plan for increased accessibility throughout the Board.

The Accessibility Working Group will ensure that in respect of the Multi-Year Accessibility Plan the following steps take place:

- (a) An annual status report on measures taken to implement the plan is prepared.
- (b) At least once every five years the plan is reviewed and updated in consultation with persons with disabilities, with the Board's Special Education Advisory Committee and with other relevant committees.

## **11.0 Communication of the Plan**

In addition to the public availability of the Plan as noted on the cover, an annual status report of the Multi-year Accessibility Plan will be posted on the Board's website. The Board will accommodate requests for accessible formats of the Plan.
